Up late with Noel Staunton

If you've had the pleasure of attending one of the myriad`performances at *Brisbane Festival* during the past three years, you may have happened to see a particular bearded gent wandering amongst the crowds. He might have been striking up a conversation with complete strangers following a performance. Or he may have been seated amidst an enraptured audience, paying closer attention to each spectator's individual reaction rather than the action on stage. Or perhaps he was just standing still amongst the throng of Festival-goers, taking in the electric ambience of a city at the height of its cultural element.

The man in question is Noel Staunton. And what may seem like somewhat idiosyncratic behaviour to anyone else is, in fact, perfectly normal for the man who has spent the past year intricately selecting and weaving together the individual fibres of *Brisbane Festival*. As the artistic director of one of Brisbane's most important annual cultural events, Noel's task is to curate the perfect mix of local, interstate and international acts that will not only entertain the city's revellers, but simultaneously surprise and challenge them.

For Noel, the programming of a Festival comes together not by accident but by design. "For me the Festival is part of the fibre of the city and everyone who lives here should feel that it belongs to them," he elaborates. "They can go out and do things that they wouldn't normally do, see things they wouldn't normally see, and generally have a nice time."

Contrary to what one might imagine, the three weeks in September when the Festival takes place are actually the least stressful for Noel. "When we launch the Festival, my job is done and nobody wants to talk to me because they're all too busy trying to make it happen!" he laughs. But that period of creative downtime during the Festival itself allows him to really tap into which parts of the program are connecting with audiences and which aren't. "During the actual Festival, I do very little. And I'm always amazed that anyone turns up! I stand there and think, 'Oh my god there's all these people—how wonderful is that.'"

Much of Noel's time during the Festival is spent roaming around and sitting next to people, listening to them digest their thoughts about the performances they have just seen. "I listen to what they're liking and disliking and try to respond to that type of dialogue," he explains. "It's wonderful to hear people's views. What I love is the whole sense of debate—people will tell you at great length why something is right or wrong. And I think that's very exciting that people feel comfortable with you to be able to have that discussion. To me it's not about right or wrong; it's about people's experiences. If they have a bad experience, they can tell you, but it doesn't mean that they distrust the Festival. They accept that they're going to see a lot of shows they don't know and some of them have a good experience while others don't, but that's the point of the Festival it's a source of debate. And in that three-week period, you'll probably go to shows that you'd never go to in the rest of the year."

As to what we can expect from *Brisbane Festival* in 2013, Noel reveals that the focus this year, for the first time, is on younger generations. "This year's Festival is a lot about what I call 'street'—about young people's stories and telling those stories in a very contemporary way. We've got a big production called *Freeze Frame*, which is the story of kids from west central Los Angeles who are at the age where they either get a gun, kill a friend and become a member of a gang, or they join a dance troupe—it's a fascinating idea to me that an eight-year-old has to make that decision. The fact that it all happens right in the middle of a first-grade country, ten blocks from the centre of a very civilised, affluent city is astounding. And we're also telling the same stories about Australian kids with disadvantaged backgrounds, but through art in the *Body Language* exhibition. I thought it would be great to be able to hold a mirror up to Australia and America,

reflecting these universal stories. So in the foyer, you have stories about Australian kids told through art, and in the theatre you have stories of American kids told through music and dance. "

A large part of the Festival's foundation this year will also be attributed to the Independent Theatre Program. The thrilling series of works, curated by David Berthold, will shine a spotlight on independent theatre that has struggled to find recognition. "In Brisbane there are certain groups of people who are slightly dispossessed—in other Australian cities there's a much bigger, more connected independent theatre scene," Noel says. "What we're trying to do is stir up the local part and give people a platform where their work can get to a certain level and be part of something big. And we are also doing independent work from interstate and overseas to provide a mix. I always say that we live in Brisbane but we work the world. The whole idea is that it's about Brisbane and we're responding to what we think Brisbane audiences want."

Another key goal of the Festival is to give locals the opportunity to see the best of Australian theatre, dance and music. Noel explains. "Lots of very good Australian shows don't come to Brisbane, so we chose some of these shows that would otherwise never been seen and put them in the Festival. It really gives the sense that there are a lot of great Australian shows around."

When pondering the words of advice he'd give to revellers as to how they can get the most out of this year's Festival, Noel says that the key is to find a balance between the trusted and the unexpected. "Pick the genres you like—whether it's theatre, dance or music—and go and see as much as you can," he encourages. "You're bound to find something that will really surprise you and that's the most exciting part of a Festival."



Frame by frame with Debbie Allen

In some of the toughest neighbourhoods of Los Angeles, young children are raised amongst the turmoil of streetgang warfare and many pick up a gun before their tenth birthday. But for some there is a way out though their dreams of life outside their zip code.

It is this emotional crossroads that forms the basis of *Freeze Frame*—a fusion of dance, music, cinema and theatre that will take to the stage in its world premiere at *Brisbane Festival*. The passionate spirit behind this revolutionary work is Debbie Allen, whose prolific artistic presence spans television, movies and the Broadway stage, as well as her work choreographing for icons such as Michael Jackson, Mariah Carey, Whitney Houston and Sammy Davis, Jr. But in addition to her plethora of career triumphs, there's yet another string to Debbie's bow the ability to make dreams come true.

Long before she was beloved by millions in her role as dance teacher Lydia Grant in eighties hit *Fame*, Debbie used to perform to a somewhat smaller audience. "I remember going into the backyard and my audience was the trees and the birds," she explains of discovering her love for dance as a child. "I was kind of just dancing to the universe. Dancing made me feel happy and gave me a sense of freedom and abandon. I was able to express myself and it seemed to me like I was giving joy to the world."

But the world didn't always return such joy for the spirited young dancer. Growing up in Texas in the era of segregation, Debbie and her siblings—including actress Phylicia Rashad—were constantly judged on the colour of their skin. At 16, already an accomplished dancer, Debbie auditioned for the North Carolina School of the Arts. Despite being the best dancer in the room, she was told that she would never make it in the world of dance—all because her skin was black.

"I wanted to give up right then and there because it was so hurtful," she recalls. "Imagine being a young child who had worked her whole life for this dream and then being told that you'll never make it as a dancer because your body is the wrong type. It was horrible and I did give up, but it was my mum who really got me back in the race. She didn't let me blame it on the people who I felt were being racist. She told me that I had failed—and that was tough, but it made me realise that I had to get back up. I learnt that I couldn't blame someone else." Instead of giving up, Debbie channelled her disappointment into determination—and a wildly successful career. And along with it came a passion not only for overcoming barriers herself, but also providing the platform for other young people to do the same. In 2001, she opened the Debbie Allen Dance Academy (DADA), a non-profit organisation dedicated to providing access to dance and theatre arts for disadvantaged young people in the greater Los Angeles area. Inspired by her own struggles, Debbie's vision was firm—no one would be judged on their body type and colour. And the education would not simply be technical, but rather a 'character' education that would teach students selfesteem, discipline, creativity and self-confidence.

"What's important to me is that the academy is open to the young people who have the spirit of the dance in them and love it and want to get it out," she emphasises. "And it's never been about body type. It's the heartbeat of the dancer that I'm looking for the interior not the exterior."

Debbie will be accompanied by several talented students from DADA—along with a select flock of professional dancers—when she brings *Freeze Frame* to life for the first time at *Brisbane Festival*. "This show is not like anything I've ever done," Debbie explains of her inspiration. "A lot of it came from living in Los Angeles, where there are children and young people lost to gun violence every day. And that violence can come from the gangs, the police, or even just internal family conflicts. It's really about the despair at the loss of life for no real good reason. That was something that really affected and touched me."

Having raised children of her own in Los Angeles, and seen the impact of gangs on many of her students, Debbie knew that this was a story she needed to tell. "When I first started thinking about *Freeze Frame*, it was something that I wanted to write, and really go and do the research. A lot of it was right there in my face, but I wanted to go further. I tried to understand the origins of gangs, and I spent time with some serious gangs and visited mothers who had lost their children. Then I looked at regular kids in everyday life who just want to go to school, but there are so many guns on the street in America it's possible to get shot just going to the movies. It's about all that, but it's also about the dreams of these young people who come out of that neighbourhood." Not only does *Freeze Frame* perfectly capture the youth focus of this year's *Brisbane Festival*, but it also illustrates Debbie's own passion for working with young people and helping them to chase their dreams. "I can't explain it it's just who I am and where my heartbeat is," she says. "It's where I've been able to change and transform lives. When you can inspire and touch young people who end up doing amazing things, it's a very spiritual thing. I say I go to church every day at my dance academy, because that's what it is for me."

As for the people who have touched and inspired her personally, Debbie immediately cites iconic American choreographers Katherine Dunham and Alvin Ailey. "The greatest lesson I've taken away from those mentors—not only through conversations but also experiencing who they were—is that, when you are an artist, and you are speaking through the language of your art, you must speak the truth as you see it. And you must not be afraid to say whatever it is you're trying to say. You must be true to yourself and then you will find real purpose."

When asked why she chose *Brisbane Festival* for the world premiere of *Freeze Frame*, Debbie says she couldn't have found a better place. "I've fallen in love with Noel Staunton," she laughs cheekily. "And with the whole creative think tank that's going on in Australia as far as theatre is concerned. It's really a birthplace for vibrant, wonderful theatre, so I feel privileged to be coming to Australia to make this presentation. *Freeze Frame* is a very contemporary music collage that certainly will attract the interest of some people around the world. There's a lot of joy and great dancing and music in it, and I think that's what the arts are for—to reflect the human condition and to touch the audience and make them see, feel and think."

What she hopes young people will take away from the show is the notion that anything is possible as long as you believe in it. "I have a new phrase that I've put to my whole staff and all my students: 'We dream and we do'. If you can dream it, it's possible. Dreams are a true manifestation of what is real and they are important. You've got to dream and do, but you've also got to believe that it can happen and never give up on it."



Independent Theatre with David Berthold

His business card may say artistic director, but David Berthold prefers to view his metier from a more conceptual perspective. In addition to his current directorship of La Boite Theatre Company, David sees his role as that of an enabler—one who acts as an artistic catalyst, bringing new works to life and helping the artists involved to rise to their full potential. And it is this particular skill he will call upon during his role as curator of *Brisbane Festival*'s Independent Theatre Program, where some of the city's—and the world's—most exciting new works will leap into the spotlight.

"When I look back, even just simply over shows I've directed, probably about 60 or 70% of them have been productions of new Australian plays," David explains. "So a very big part of my directing career has been working with living playwrights on new works. And part of the role of a director working on new plays is working as an enabler."

David is the perfect choice to be entrusted with the curation of the Independent Theatre Program, which—taking place at QUT Kelvin Grove and Metro Arts—will form an important part of this year's *Brisbane Festival*. Bringing together independent theatre works from the local, national and international stages, David is delighted at the chance to push to the fore the works of independent artists and companies that might otherwise be overlooked.

"I think it's connected to what I was saying about enabling ," he explains. "These works have come about because one artist, or a group of artists, has felt passionately about a particular work. Or the artists have come together because they have a shared aesthetic or a shared view of the world. So these projects are born out of forceful and genuine passion that's something that's very appealing to me and has always been a driving force, so it feels natural to be engaging at this level."

On what makes the program so unique, David says it's the fact that there's a palpable energy and rawness that comes with recently developed works. "I think it's that kind of newness and the sense that everything is born, very recently, out of passion. This is not old work in any way, but work that is absolutely being created in the here and now, through the blood, sweat and tears of the performers you see on stage. And in some ways that becomes a snapshot of something that might be happening in society. If there's this big group of artists who are all working separately but creating a certain sort of aesthetic, or a certain sort of energy or view of the world, then it says something about the world."

His focus when bringing together the individual threads of the Independent Theatre Program was to find a connection between the works that could not only stimulate a conversation with the audiences, but also between the artists themselves.

"It's about being alert to the sorts of things that are going on and, at times, the subterranean links between works," he explains. "Sometimes artists will bubble up works around the place, and not necessarily think about being connected to what other artists are doing. But I think the role of an artistic director or curator is to help audiences—and sometimes artists to see the links. Part of the creativity is finding a way for the works to be in conversation with each other, so that they're not isolated events but part of a much broader and more lively conversation."

The spotlight on ground-breaking independent works also promises to give audiences a thrill, challenging their perceptions of traditional theatre. "A lot of the work is pushing boundaries both in style and in content," David says. "It's performance that sits on the edge of what performers can do and I think that's always a great pleasure for audiences, to see performers right on the edge of their ability."

In addition to the works themselves, he is particularly excited about a new dimension of the festival known as the QUT Theatre Republic. The concept will see the La Boite Theatre Company space and its surrounds transformed into a kind of 'theatre nation', complete with its own inherent principles and aspirations driven by creativity. "The notion of the QUT Theatre Republic is a really exciting one, because it's very new and will create a new hub for the festival," David explains animatedly. "We've grouped many works around that notion—a great level of individuality and a huge level of aspiration. And also a joy—with a lot of the stuff that's at the QUT Theatre Republic, one of the things that binds it together is a real sense of theatrical joy." What he loves most about the festival as an audience member is the element of surprise. "I think it's about discovering things that you didn't know you were going to discover. While you often choose the things you'd like to see, more often than not your favourite experiences at the festival are ones that you weren't expecting at all. The surprise that a festival can give you is often the thing that stays with you the most."

David says that the opportunity to curate the Independent Theatre Program has helped him to remain open-minded about different approaches to the art form. "It's very easy as an artist to rely on habit," he explains. "And to rely on habit is death. I think that's one of the big challenges for any artist to remain open. In a way, for me, doing this work for *Brisbane Festival* has been that because it's put me in contact with artists who I wouldn't have otherwise come in contact with. And it's challenged a lot of the ways I think about theatre making and performance. That's why I was so excited to take on this role."

Santos GLNG City of Lights Sat 7–Fri 27 Sep

Brisbane River will be closed nightly for safety in the South Brisbane Reach between the Victoria and Goodwill Bridges. The closure will be for 12 minute periods at 7pm and 8.30pm, Sunday to Thursday and 7pm, 8pm and 9pm, Friday and Saturday evenings. Queensland Water Police will close and monitor the River nightly and minor delays may be experienced on the Citycat and Cityferry services during performance times.

Sunsuper Riverfire Sat 28 Sep

There will be extensive road closures throughout the City, South Bank, West End, Kangaroo Point and Fortitude Valley areas.

Victoria Bridge traffic lanes will close to vehicular traffic (except Translink's Busway which remains open), between 4pm and 10.30pm. Traffic lanes will become available for pedestrian use between 5pm and 9.30pm. The western footpath of the Victoria Bridge (Museum side) will be closed between 5pm and 10.30pm. The eastern foothpath (South Bank side) remains open at all times.

The Goodwill and Kurilpa Bridges will close to all traffic (including pedestrians and cyclists) from 5pm to 7.30pm.

The Story Bridge will be closed to all traffic and pedestrians between 6.20pm and 8pm. The eastern foothpath (Dockside side) closes at these times however the western footpath (City side) closes earlier—from 2am on Friday 27 September and reopens later at 8.30pm on Saturday 28 September.

Bowen Terrace, Fortitude Valley will close between the Story Bridge and Bowen Street between 6.30pm and 8.30pm. Local streets linking Brunswick Street and Bowen Terrace will be closed between 6.30pm and 8.30pm, with access open to local residents only.

Kangaroo Point

Measures have been introduced to alleviate congestion and improve safety in the Story Bridge and Kangaroo Point Precincts.

Story Bridge Precinct

No parking will be permitted on both sides of Main Street between Baildon and Holman Streets with a two-minute drop off zone established on both sides of Main Street between Mackenzie and Wicklow Streets. Any vehicles parked in this section of Main Street will be towed.

Holman Street will be closed at Main Street with access only permitted for residents upon proof of residency. Any vehicles parked in Holman Street will be booked and towed except for authorised Brisbane Festival suppliers and Emergency Services vehicles.

Cliffs Precinct

No parking will be permitted along River Terrace all day, offenders will be towed.

River Terrace at Main Street and Leopard Street at Vulture Street will be closed between 4pm and 9.30pm.

Local streets linking River Terrace to Main Street will be closed between 4pm and 9.30pm, with access open to local residents only.

Both sets of pedestrian stairs up Kangaroo Point Cliffs will be closed between 6.55pm and 7.30pm.

The service road below the Kangaroo Point Cliffs will be closed at Captain Cook Bridge all day, except for authorised Brisbane Festival suppliers and Emergency Services vehicles.

Mt Coot-tha and Mt Gravatt Lookouts

All traffic to the Mt Coot-tha Summit must travel counter clockwise along Sir Samuel Griffith Drive as directed by police from 4.30pm.

The Mt Gravatt Lookout will be closed to all traffic at Shire Road and Tenby Street between 4pm and 9pm. Echidna Magic Restaurant guests will be granted access.

Access to car parks and facilities South Bank Precinct

No parking will be permitted along Grey Street between Vulture Street and William Jolly Bridge all day.

Colchester Street closes all day between Ernest and Vulture Streets.

Little Stanley Street closes from midnight Thursday 26 September until 3pm on Sunday 29 September.

South Bank's car park reaches 'full' capacity early and no access is available between 7.15pm and 9.30pm. After 7.15pm all vehicles exiting must exit via Tribune and Vulture Streets. Brisbane Festival recommends you take advantage of the additional public transport services in place for *Sunsuper Riverfire*. For details call TRANSLINK 13 12 30.

From 4pm, entry to QPAC and Queensland Museum car parks will only be available from Stanley Place, near the State Library of Queensland. QPAC ticket holders are advised to allow extra travel time.

Access to BCEC car parks is via Merivale Street.

Spectator vessels on the Brisbane River

In the interest of public safety and in accordance with the Queensland Fireworks Code, the Brisbane River will be closed between Mowbray Park, East Brisbane and Cribb Street, Milton from 5pm until 8.45pm. Two dedicated spectator mooring zones will be established in the Town Reach of the River for a limited number of private vessels who obtained Entry Permit Flags on Wednesday 21 August. Only Entry Permit Flag holders will be permitted to anchor in mooring zones in the closed area of the River.
